# New Starters...



## **Plans Unveiled for 2018**

"There are some exciting developments happening at Horticap this year. Firstly, we are extending the students' mess room to approximately double its existing size. The plans have been passed by the Council planning department and we have received quotes from builders. We are currently looking at these, with a view to involve the students as much as we can, taking into account health and safety requirements. We feel that student involvement enhances their time at Horticap, giving them fulfilling and varied opportunities, particularly as this is their mess room. This development will include improved kitchen facilities and a disabled toilet. We are hoping to complete the work in 2018.

The second development is to demolish the existing 'lean-to' tearoom and shop, and erect a more substantial, two-storey building with a café and kitchen. This will enable us to serve light meals, which will increase footfall in the café, shop and plant sales area. This is an ambitious plan. The architect has produced some artist's impressions, which, when revised, will be made available for people to view. We will be applying for planning permission in the next few weeks and will engage a quantity surveyor to give us a rough cost. With regard to the new café, it will need to be professionally managed and staffed. We are currently discussing whether we should involve appropriate students in some way to give them work experience in catering. We are taking our time over the development plans to

ensure the end result is both aesthetically pleasing, and will help us achieve our objectives, as stated in our strategic five-year plan.

Thirdly, we have plans to further improve the outside area this spring and summer. This will make the pathways more accessible. Again, we will involve students, staff and volunteers where feasible. At the appropriate time we will hold a party to celebrate our achievements, and we will invite our patron, Alan Titchmarsh, to officially open the new buildings."

# What's on Offer

The benches in the greenhouses are filling up as we sow, pot and bring on the perennial and bedding plants in preparation for the year ahead. Perennial plants provide flowers

year after year, and we make sure that all our plug perennials are potted on in fresh compost to promote healthy strong roots and shoots. Once established, perennial plants are easy to look after and they can provide colour through out the year. At Horticap we have a variety to choose from and our reliable favourites include Astrantias, Geraniums, Dianthus, Heucheras and Penstemon...but we have plenty more, and we are always happy to help you make the right choice. Annual plants, often known as bedding, complete their growing cycle (growing from seed,



flowering and producing seed) in the course of a single growing season. One of the best things about annuals is their incredible diversity and versatility and using them allows you to compose really exciting combinations of colour, form and texture that will last all season long. They are perfect for containers, hanging baskets and filling in the gaps in the perennial border. Choose from Begonias, Petunias, Marigolds and Lobelia...whatever your budget pay us a visit and get lots of useful and creative ideas for your outdoor space.

We'd like to thank the **Freemasons** for their generosity. The Harrogate & Claro Lodge No 1001 presented Horticap with a specialist vehicle trailer. The funds were provided by the West Yorkshire Provincial Grand Master's Charity Fund and the trailer will enable a second team of Horticap students to transport our mowers and other gardening equipment to carry out horticultural work in the local area.

The trailer was handed over to us by Joe Cocker, the Worshipful Master of Harrogate and Claro Lodge No 1001 who explained "This particular charity is the sort we are looking to support within the Harrogate area as they provide vital support, training and guidance to vulnerable adults."

We can't give too much away at the moment, but Helen and her team will be unveiling their latest creations on the Horticap show garden at Harrogate Spring Flower Show in April. It promises to be even better than before and the characters planned for 2018 are really NOT to be missed.









### A Simple Act makes a Great Impact

Plastic... it's everywhere and we must all do our bit to recycle as much as we can. In Britain we throw away about 513,000 tonnes of plastic bottles every year - that is around 8 billion bottles!

Many of these end up in landfill where they take up lots of space. They also end up in oceans and our natural environments, so we need to look at alternatives.

We've been using our plastic milk cartons to keep the birds away from the vegetable patch and we've also been making bird feeders from plastic bottles. Plastic drink bottles can also be used to make flowers which we think will brighten up any space – far better than sitting in landfill and an opportunity to be creative with our waste!

Although we use plastic flower pots for our perennials, any used pots are cleaned in buckets, removing the old labels and sorted into size so we can store and reuse them. This is a great task for the winter months and is well worth the effort when spring comes back around and we are busy potting up new plants.









It's also really simple and easy to make your own eco-friendly paper pots for sowing, using newspaper, which is completely biodegradable.

These paper pots are a great alternative for seedlings, and once the plant is growing strongly the whole pot can be planted into the ground and it will decompose as the plant grows.

You could also use cardboard egg boxes for shallow rooting crops like salad leaves and courgettes and you can use toilet roll tubes for sowing deeper rooted seeds like sweet peas and beans.

Horticap is proud to produce our own **GREEN ENERGY**. In May 2009, as a result of a generous donation by GW Bulmer Charitable Trust, we were able to start generating our electricity with our own wind turbine. Electricity produced by the turbine is used firstly on site and any surplus is sold back to the grid. We also capture rain in our four large water tanks. Also take a visit to our Nature trail where we have been highlighting the effect of the overuse of plastic and its impact. Volunteer Joan has used containers filled with the types of plastic that end up in our oceans. Large pieces can entangle animals whilst tiny pieces cause harm by entering the food chain. Joan's exhibit also includes a life size whale to raise awareness and highlight how even a creature as large as a whale can succumb to pollution.



**FACT** - between 5 million and 13 million tonnes of plastic leak into the world's oceans every year. That's more than the combined weight of every single blue whale on Earth.



Our recycling doesn't just happen in the green houses and the garden.

We use reclaimed pallets in our workshop to create all sorts of items for sale which include birdhouses, benches, log stores and raised beds. We also repair old garden furniture, replacing the wood and giving a fresh coat of varnish leaving them looking as good as new.

We can all do it...just a few simple steps and thinking about the materials we use everyday can make a difference.

Nicky was a volunteer at Horticap for 18 months before being asked to become a Trustee. Her background was as an administrator in several schools and she was delighted to be given the opportunity to become more involved with such a worthwhile organisation. She works with the students offering creative and instructional support - she involves the students in art activities, giving them the chance to express themselves and to gain confidence and self-worth. Nicky believes that "having people with different experiences, ages and backgrounds at Trustee level can really improve the impact charities have. It's just as important to have life skills, the ability to get on with others and to encourage teamwork. We are keen to bring volunteers and Trustees together on a more regular basis as this allows the sharing of ideas to improve what we have to offer the students. There is so much to look forward to at Horticap at the moment, there are exciting plans in the pipeline which will enable us to continue to improve the provision for our students."

Peter is an accountant and worked for many years in the public and private sectors. He was also a Trustee and Deputy Chair of Yorkshire Cancer Research between 2010 and 2015. What I've enjoyed most is getting to meet and work with our staff, students and volunteers and seeing how they've developed. The highlight this year for me was the Awards evening - everyone gets an award, but for five students to get national achievement awards is a testament to the hard work put in by staff and volunteers as well as the students themselves. It's an exciting time for Horticap, there are some exciting developments on the horizon and I'll be delighted to contribute what I can to making Horticap the best it can be for our current and future students".


