For many years now, small groups of our students have been invited by Leeds and Skyrack Lions, to enjoy an exchange trip to Germany.

This July saw six Horticap students benefiting from this programme, and what a time they all had. Here is just a small snapshot of their adventures!



Day 1 was an early start with an early start and drive to Manchester airport for the flight to Frankfurt, and then a drive to the Deula Hotel in Witzenhausen. Day 3 saw the group barefoot walking on Mount Meissner, sailing on Lake Werravalley and the honour of being invited to a BBQ, and watching the Euro final, at the Bad Sooden-Allendorf President's home!

The evening activity included a short hike to Tillyschanze where they explored a tower and then had dinner.

Day 5 was a very varied day with the first visit being to the Bergwildpark at Germerode. After lunch at the park, the group took in an ice-cream parlour at Eschwege before enjoying dinner and entertainment at Kochsberg Hotel.





Day 6 included a walk around Melsungen and a fun pedal boat session on the River Fulda. This was followed by an interesting visit to Stickerei Sattler to see some embroidery.

Continuing our memories as part of our 40th Anniversary year, we move on to look at 2004 to 2014

With student numbers now in the mid 40 attending each week, this decade saw an expansion of facilities for our students and a growing number of visitors to the site.

A new modern glasshouse took shape occupying an area previously used for growing Christmas trees. This was used mainly for growing seasonal bedding plants and was equipped with thermal screens, automatic ventilation, moveable benches, a wood fired heating system and water harvesting.

A few years later a dedicated education building / office was built. We were thrilled that Alan Titchmarch agreed to become Horticaps Patron and he officially opened our new building.

2008 saw a visit to Horticap from the Duke of Gloucester leading to the delivery of compost bins by a group of staff and students to his home in London. The following year we celebrated our 25th anniversary.



















With our nature trail now developing, a new purpose built bird hide was installed by our students in the wildlife area so increasing the visitor experience. Alongside a new vegetable garden.

Along with our glasshouse wood burner, other environmental issues were addressed including a wind turbine, the provision of a recycling building where students could work on recycling pots, chopping logs to sell and use in our heater. Also additional rainwater storage tanks.



Once again poor weather particularly in 2012 took its toll on some of our tunnels and buildings.







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Celebrating our Volunteers

We cannot stress enough how important our volunteers are to every part of Horticap, and it is true to say that the charity simply couldn't manage or exist without them. The expertise, passion and willingness to do virtually anything that is asked of them is remarkable, and we thank them all very much! This edition introduces Pauline and Viv and first of all, Caroline.

"The reason for volunteering is definitely because of my mother, Anne Moore who was there at Horticap's beginnings in 1984.

At that time, she was President of Harrogate Inner Wheel Club, and through Rotarian Alan Ravenscroft, she heard all about this new charity that provided a sheltered workplace for adults with learning difficulties.



The aims and objectives resonated with Mum as her only sibling Tom, who had struggled with mental health difficulties in adult life, had recently died. Along with her Inner Wheel friends they held a large raffle at the Harrogate Spring Flower Show, then in the Valley Gardens. Later that same year they held another money raising event at the Yorkshire Agricultural show. Together with the money from the earlier raffle, they were able to buy Horticap's first greenhouse. For the next 35 years, the Inner Wheel Club always remembered Horticap in their fund-raising activities. By end of 1984, Mum was on the Board of Horticap along with John Wooton (former manager of Marks & Spencer) and John Green. Over that time, she worked tirelessly to help and promote Horticap. She was instrumental in approaching Alan Titchmarsh to be Horticap's patron in 2003, for securing funding from Charitable Trusts to improve the site, and countless talks and fund-raising events. After her death we planted a crab apple tree in her memory in the garden to commemorate and celebrate her long association with her favourite Charity.

I moved to Harrogate in 1994 and soon became a volunteer helping initially in the green houses making hanging baskets with students. In November 1995, along with some friends and Mum, we held the first Art Show in the Wesley Chapel. This became an annual event and over the next decade we welcomed artists to show their work whilst raising a total of £35,000 for Horticap. Our biggest event was a Fashion Show at the Cairn Hotel in 2008 raising £8,000 which was a lot of money then. After Covid, we reformed the committee and to date we have run Christmas flower demonstrations, 3 fun quiz nights, a Grand raffle and a Celebration Summer Garden party, raising £15,000.

Raising funds for Horticap is ongoing for us, as is working with the team in the café where I have weekly workouts carrying trays of food and drink up the stairs!

From me I guess it is all about embracing my Mum's vision and continuing what she helped to start 40 years ago."

20 years at Horticap for Pauline



"It's been a great privilege to be part of the Horticap family for over twenty years. Of course there have been many changes during that time, not only staff but buildings too. When I joined there was a large wooden building which housed the shop and store room. Students used the mess room and locker room, and wooden buildings which still survive. The office and board room were housed in the two portacabins in the yard.

We worked mainly with a group of students in old poly tunnels, one of the two large wooden greenhouses or the gardens. However, the buildings really didn't matter, it was the students who were important...and still are! Horticap is not only a place of work and training, but a place of fun and friendship. It's a family.

We've shared lots of celebrations together over the years as the site has gradually developed and our new buildings have taken shape. We've had great garden parties and wonderful fund raising events but our Awards Ceremony to celebrate the achievements of our students comes top for me. It's so good to see each student grow, not only in gardening skills but in confidence and social skills too.

When you join Horticap you become part of the family. Our students are great at welcoming new faces and making you feel welcome.

From helping with plants in my early days, I've been teaching craft skills for many years now. Amongst other things, we've decorated plant pots and china mugs, painted silk scarves, made mosaic tiles, sewn cushions and recycled hundreds of greetings cards. All of which our students are proud to see go on sale in our shop.

The Horticap symbol is appropriately a tree, growing steadily and setting down its roots. So to celebrate our new building, our students both designed and made a large mosaic tree which is now hanging up on the wall looking over our lovely café.

"The seed was sown when I heard a talk from a member of Horticap at the Women's Club about 35 years ago. Sometime later I was working at the college where students with learning difficulties were taught life skills, and I was impressed with the friendship, support of one another and the joy they engendered.

Years later at work, we had to fill in our assessment forms and the final question was, "Where would like to find yourself in five years' time?" (or words to that effect) and that was a light bulb moment for me. In my upcoming retirement from full time occupation, I wanted to become a volunteer at Horticap.

Fortunately, I saw an advertisement for volunteers at, yes you've guessed it, Horticap! It was 2005, and after an interview in a converted shipping container,

also known as the office, I was accepted as a volunteer, and after the necessary check, was invited to commence volunteering in 2006.

What a wonderful place to be, learning from students and the knowledgeable staff about horticulture. After instruction from two of the hanging basket creators, the students decided that it would be best if I collected the layers of plants for them, (46 in total which was the prescribed formation) as I did not come up to their standard or speed, in the hanging basket area! I was given many tasks, filling pots and trays for plug plants to be inserted, or to strip seed trays for potting on, watering the plants, tidying and cleaning the benches, sweeping the floor and helping decorate the Christmas wreaths.

Their knowledge of which size of container or pot to use was brilliant, and I only had to ask them in order to find out which pot to fill with compost, ready for them to pot up the plants. Tidying the pots on the rack was an ongoing task and not the favourite job of everyone!

When we worked in the greenhouses we had time to chat with the students about their likes and dislikes. I was impressed with their knowledge of pop music, culture, singers and groups, films (particularly the James Bond series) and of course football, which was discussed and argued over, along with other chit chat.

The site is unrecognisable now compared to 2006 with the new heated greenhouse, sales centre, smart office and wonderful cafe facilities, not to mention the car parking area. The cafe and shop have given the students further work experience opportunities. The excitement of the students when they are wearing their white t-shirts to work in Hopkins is palpable.

Many volunteers have contributed, as have committee members. This has taken Horticap to a whole new level, giving the students a safe haven to work to their best level, and to meet and work with fellow students under the guidance of skilled staff.

Thank you for allowing me to be part of this successful enterprise."

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
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
