Along with pack-ups, as requested by our student Simon, and a celebratory cake from Julie in the office, we travelled in the old van to bring back the new one. We were all very excited as we had been checking out the prices of new vans for a while, and finally we found what we wanted that was within our price bracket. To say that the students were excited was an understatement!

Naturally the students wanted to check the vehicle over, so Simon measured up the back to make sure that the mowers would fit in, Jamie checked

the electronics and satnav, Stuart looked for a big engine but could only find a small electric motor, and Liam...Liam looked at motorbikes with Dan!

Dion, the Sales Executive at the dealership had been pre-warned that there would be some hard bargaining by the students (which was actually already done, but it was important that our students have real ownership of this van), and after they had 'struck the deal', they all shook hands. The students were delighted; we had bought Horticap's very first full electric van!



When all was sorted, it was time to come back... Funnily enough, when we set off to Chesterfield, the old van was full of students but when we came back, it was the new one in favour, with only one student choosing to ride in the old one – Simon, who fell asleep for the entire journey home through his excitement! Our new van had found a new home, but we needed to make it ours!

We called round to One Nine Signs in Harrogate, and got a great deal to put our logo on the van, along with logos of the other local businesses who had made significant donations. Being in a position to buy this vehicle has been a long time in the making. Making a garden statement!

- Cercis canadensis

Our featured plant for this edition is the *Cercis canadensis*, a wonderful, statuesque plant that has become a very popular addition in our sales greenhouse. Native to North America and commonly known as the eastern redbud, this deciduous tree is known for having bronze and yellow heart shaped leaves and clusters of pink flowers, which flatten to deep purple seed pods in the autumn. Its smooth bark becomes scaly with age, with slender twigs which may appear almost black. They are stunning!

In addition to being an ornamental tree, the rich nectar from the blossom offers food to bees and butterflies, with some birds feasting on the seed pods in the late summer and autumn. A mature Cercis canadensis has a dense canopy which provides important shelter for small animals, illustrating its environmental importance. It is recognised as having a significant role in improving and maintaining the health and function of ecosystems.


always love hearing of her plans before she goes, and of everything that she has done when she returns, particularly the antics of the gulls!


Stuart's Diary

Doing our bit for sustainability!



The value to the environment of using peat free compost is well documented, and Horticap now only sells this planting medium. Peatlands are the UKs largest stores of carbon, and the more it is harvested for compost, the more carbon is released into the atmosphere. Reducing this carbon release is beneficial to us all, as is protecting these precious peatlands which support the habitats of many rarer wildlife species, as well as its maintaining an ability to prevent flooding. However, peat free compost

performs a little differently to the compost we are all used to using.

We are aware that some customers have found the transition to using peat free compost a little challenging, so our students have some handy hints to give you the best chance of gardening success.

- Water little and often as peat free compost can be quite free draining. Pots can also look dry, but have enough moisture for the plant so pop your finger down the side of the pot to check.
- Add a liquid feed to pots after a few weeks, as the fertilizer in new compost runs out after a short time, particularly if plants are watered often.
- Only buy as you need due to the quality of compost deteriorating over time.

· Buy the best peat free compost that can be afforded for the very best results. We have confidence that if the compost we sell is used by our Patron, Alan Titchmarsh, then our gardening customers will also find it a good product to use!

Horticap is proud of its sustainable achievements. and we do our very best to use our collected garden waste from our contract work, and our own site as ethically as possible. Wherever possible, we chip wood which we use for mulch

on our garden borders, and you will also see it on our pathways in the Nature Trail. We also have our own large composting bays, where much of our garden waste goes, and put it to good use when it has matured.

We are gradually increasing our use of peat free compost on the nursery itself, particularly with our bedding plants. We will be expanding this use on our nursery as the quality of peat free compost for commercial use improves.



Exploring compost!

Naturally, our students are very familiar with compost as they spend much of their working time at Horticap potting and repotting plants and moving compost bags around the site to where they are needed. They also have a familiarity with the different types we use, depending on the nature of the plant, along with the right conditions needed for successful composting. The right environment attracts all the bugs and creepy crawlies necessary to process the foliage into usable compost, and it was with all this in mind that Jayne's team embarked on a fun crafting session. Using colourful modelling clay to make the things they see in soil and compost, along with the resulting beautiful and well-nourished flowers, they really enjoyed themselves creating their own compost creatures!

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
