Horticap's Shed of Yesteryears

Have you noticed the addition of two exhibitions by the side of the sales greenhouse? Celebrating 40 years of Horticap in 2024 brought back lots of happy memories for our longer standing students of how work practices have changed, and the kinds of tools that they commonly used back in the early days. Some equipment has not changed much, but some have and it is testament to our students that they have adjusted their working styles to accommodate these changes, both in the workshop and for their horticultural activities.

These displays have been made possible as we are

often gifted old tools and utensils that have lived a life and are largely redundant in the modern age. Some, of course, are repurposed by volunteer William and sold for the benefit of the charity, but we thought that visitors, and our students, would enjoy being reminded of the items they would commonly see and use in their everyday lives, or serve as a glimpse into the past for younger generations. So we present our Workshop and Kitchen displays as a glimpse into the past.

The Workshop reflects a time before power and automated equipment, and the skilled trades that crafted these fine tools and used them in daily life. Tools include antique saws, braces and planes, used in the production of handmade furniture, right through to the impressive scythe and agricultural fork that would have been used in fields to harvest crops.

The Kitchen celebrates an example of domestic life in a mid-20th century kitchen, and the tools for cooking, baking and preservation that would have been in daily use to prepare home cooked meals, in times before the convenience of ready meals and fast-food deliveries.

We hope these displays leave visitors with a renewed appreciation of the skills and effort that went into everyday life in the not-so-distant past, and a respect for our parents and grandparents who made and used the items on display.

Sustainability for the Future

This year, each newsletter has visited the various ways that Horticap helps the environment by improving its sustainability. We have featured recycling, the transition to renewables and water capture, but we know there is much more that we can do here and we are never complacent about our responsibilities. This edition champions our ethos and strengths.

- We have a holistic approach with sustainability being integrated not only in plant production but in education, social engagement, biodiversity and infrastructure improvements.
- Our biodiversity and habitat support includes the pond, wildlife areas, wooded sections and bug hotels showing an attention to nature, beyond just growing plants.
- Social sustainability is central to our mission by supporting adults with disabilities
 with training, developing skills and community involvement, all which contributes to
 sustainable social benefit.
- Practical improvements include upgrading polytunnels, addressing drainage, replacing old facilities and improving our nature trails, which are real and tangible steps.
- Using peat-free compost helps to reduce the environmental degradation associated with peat extraction. Recycling and reusing pots enables us to reduce waste and lessens the demand for new plastic.
- Our educational outreach programme by engaging with schools and the community, teaches children about sustainable practices and nature, which helps spread sustainability values.











Looking forward...

Why not...

...try growing bulbs in glass vases and displaying them on window sills? Just sit the bulbs on stones or glass beads with enough water to reach the bottom of the bulb and watch the roots develop, followed by the leaves and flower head. It's fascinating, and can bring a little bit of garden cheer inside, while the weather restricts our enjoyment of it outside.





Tulips Have a Long History!

Spring just wouldn't be the same without that magical splash of colour that flowering bulbs can bring. Snowdrops, the first to appear, bring a feeling of optimism to us all that the Winter is moving on, and Spring is (hopefully), just around the corner. But they all have a story to tell, and tulips are no different!

Tulips have a rich and colourful history that spans continents and centuries. Originally native to Central Asia, tulips were cultivated by the Turks as early as 1000 AD.

By the 11th century, wild tulips could be found in the gardens of Ottoman palaces. The Ottoman Empire saw tulips as symbols of paradise and perfection, culminating in the "Tulip Era" of the early 18th century, when tulip festivals flourished, and trading tulips outside the capital was a punishable offence.

Tulips were first introduced to Europe in the 16th century and quickly became popular, particularly in the Netherlands. Their vibrant colours and exotic origins sparked a frenzy known as "Tulip Mania" in the 1630s. At its height, a single tulip bulb could cost more than a house. Though the market eventually collapsed, Tulip Mania remains one of history's most famous financial bubbles.

Today, tulips are cultivated worldwide, with the Netherlands leading the global production. The country dedicates over 60,000 acres to tulip farming, and its iconic Keukenhof Gardens in Amsterdam, attracts visitors from around the world each spring.


